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Weeds!

The welcome and much needed rain that we have received will not only enable crops to grow, but will also wake up weed seeds that have been lying dormant, waiting for the opportunity to spring to life and possibly make our horses very ill. In this issue of our Newsletter, we will focus first on three plants that we should do everything we can to eradicate from our paddocks, and finish with one that, although it is considered invasive and needs to be controlled, is beneficial to our horses.

Marshmallow begins life as an innocuous looking plant that hugs the ground, but grows,



seemingly overnight, to several feet in height. Its one saving grace is that it has a long, straight, tap root which makes it relatively easy to pull up, even from clay soil. Signs of Marshmallow poisoning include sweating, rapid breathing, and muscle tremors. Some horses also develop mild diarrhoea. The symptoms are exacerbated if the horse is put under stress, or forced to move. Consult your Vet immediately if Marshmallow poisoning is suspected.

Cape Weed can cause Magnesium deficiency in horses who eat it, which manifests as



abnormal nervousness and Australian Stringhalt: a condition that is most evident if the horse is turning or backing. The hind leg or legs over flex, resulting in an obvious abnormal gait. Cape Weed flourishes in over grazed paddocks. I have been told that one way to control it is to import a large herd of Emus, who pull off the flowers and prevent the plants setting seed. I have no idea if this is true :-). Another remedy is to treat the paddocks with Dolomite. Apparently, as well as nourishing the soil, if the horses eat the mineral (which is comprised partly of Magnesium) along with the Cape Weed, the ingested Dolomite will increase the amount of Magnesium absorbed by the horse's gut.

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Deadly Nightshade contains Atropine, which also has a powerful effect on the nervous system. Nightshade poisoning has usually resulted from eating contaminated hay, but horses may eat the fresh plant if no other food source is available to them.



Symptoms of Nightshade poisoning include dilated pupils, dry mouth, light sensitivity, an irregular heartbeat, muscle tremors and convulsions. Call your Vet immediately if your horse exhibits any such symptoms.

Rosehips are the fruit that forms from rose flowers. Dog Rose bushes are a common sight along fence lines in the Adelaide Hills, and as someone who harvests them when I have the opportunity, I write from experience when stating that if the bushes are covered in hips, we can expect a cold, wet Winter. How do the bushes know to produce a good crop of fruit when favourable (to them) weather is coming? I have no idea, but Autumns when I have struggled to find hips to harvest have all been followed by mild, dry Winters.



When I have fed whole, fresh hips to our horses, they have tended to roll them around in their mouths, and then spit them out. However, if I split the hips open, the horses eat them with enthusiasm and come back for more. When I have let the horses roam around the garden and have the opportunity to help themselves, they quickly learn that if they stand by the bushes with an expectant look on their faces, I will harvest and split the hips open for them; with my arms, rather than their noses, battling the thorns. Rose hips are rich in vitamins and antioxidants, but, also, sugars; so should be fed with caution to laminitic horses and ponies.
